From Raleigh

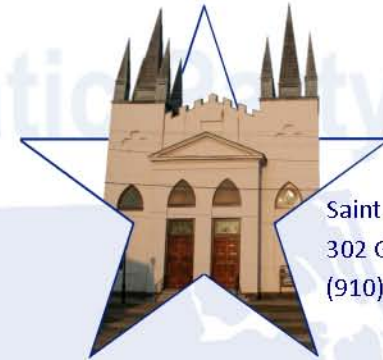
Take I-40 east to I-95 South. Take exit 56 (Business 95). Turn right onto Owen Dr. The Holiday Inn is five lights up on the right.

Gov. Terry Sanford

A proud Democrat, Terry Sanford was the 65th Governor of North Carolina (1961-1965); a two-time Presidential candidate in the 1970s, and a U.S. Senator (1986-1993).

As Governor, Sanford was a strong proponent of education and introduced a number of reforms and new programs in North Carolina's schools and institutions of higher education as the state's governor, including increasing funding for public education.

From 1969-1985, Sanford was President of Duke University. A lifelong Democrat, Sanford was noted for his progressive leadership in civil rights and education, and is remembered as a major post-war, southern public figure.

Gov. Jim Hunt

Nationally recognized for leading North Carolina through two decades of dramatic economic change and educational reform, Governor Jim Hunt spearheaded the transformation of the state's economy.

Among his many successes in public education, his early childhood program, Smart Start, has been a model for the nation and has received many, national awards. In addition, Hunt also created, with the Carnegie Foundation of New York, the National Board of Professional Teaching Standards, which he chaired for 10 years.

Under Hunt's leadership, North Carolina consistently ranked at the top of the nation in terms of economic growth, job creation, and capital investment, and was recognized for its business climate.

Hunt is the Chairman of the Board of Directors of two institutes which he founded – the Hunt Institute for Educational Leadership and Policy at UNC-Chapel Hill and the

Institute for Emerging Issues at North Carolina State University. He currently works Womble Carlyle Sandridge & Rice law firm in Raleigh.

Chief Justice Henry Frye

Born in Richmond County, Frye became in 1968 the first African-American elected to the state legislature in the 20th century.

Serving in the House from 1969 to 1980 and in the Senate from 1981 to 1982, Frye introduced legislation banning literacy tests as a requirement for voter registration.

He continued his efforts to expand opportunities for African Americans in business and public service by co-founding the Greensboro National Bank, the Legislative Black Caucus, and the Caucus' scholarship foundation.

Frye was appointed as an associate justice on the North Carolina Supreme Court by Gov. Hunt in 1983, becoming the first African-American to serve on the court. In 1999 Justice Frye became the first African-American to hold the highest post in the Court, serving as its Chief Justice until 2001. He is currently an attorney at Brooks Pierce Law Firm in Greensboro.
